An important mission that was recently conducted was a wheat seed distribution in the district of Nesh. 183 bags of wheat seed were dropped off in Nesh with the intent to encourage local farmers to grow wheat rather than opium. Wheat seed distribution is a small, but critical step towards making a dent in Afghanistan's drug trade.

At this very moment, the Afghans are celebrating the holiday of Eid Qurban--our equivalent of Christmas. Lasting for several days, depending on the moon cycle, Eid Qurban is an important holiday for

Afghanistan. In an effort to maintain a U.S. presence in the area and promote inter-cultural awareness, Battle Company

has been sending out several patrols into the neighboring villages. It is quite a warming sight to see young Afghani children, boys and girls alike, waving at U.S. troops during missions. Among these young children are the leaders of Afghanistan for generations to come; that they are receptive of coalition forces bodes well for the future of Afghanistan.

As we near the end of a long deployment, the men are anxious and in high spirits. Everyone is looking forward to returning home to love ones, but we still have a mission to carry out here in Afghanistan. The operation tempo of Battle Company has not waned in the least, and it looks like February will be a busy month. This is fine with the troops, as time tends to fly when they are busy.

The days of sweltering heat and sandstorms have vanished, making room for days of cold winds and snow. It

has been a remarkable transformation, and it has left an impression on the troops here at FOB Ripley. Change is inevitable, and Afghanistan herself has been no exception. Hello again, family and friends! This has been an excellent month for Team Cobra. Cobra Base continues to make leaps and bounds in its accommodations. We now have a gym which rivals any health club. We received weight benches and many other pieces of fitness equipment. It certainly is helping us all get even more physically fit for our ever-closer return trip home. We also have four showers in operation. And they have hot water! For some, this will be the first hot shower in the five months we've been out here. We have also installed 3 new washer and dryers. It sure beats washing clothes in a bucket! There was a slight mishap this month, however, when a large 15 foot by 20 foot portion of one of our compounds' mud walls eroded to the point where it fell over with a loud, wet "thud"! It fell due to five days of cold, torrential downpours that turned our little dust bowl into a mud pit. You know what they say, if it's not one extreme, it's the other!



This month, 1st, 3rd, and Headquarters Platoons have been conducting multiple extended missions around our

Area of Operation. We have brought medical assistance to many of our surrounding villages. The Police Force in our local town of Cehar Cineh has been provided uniforms, radios, and vehicles. We are helping to train them in order for them to better protect their own people. We have assessed many new Civil Affairs projects that we will fund in order to raise the quality of life for the Afghan people. There are multiple drinking wells and irrigation ditches being dug, a large school being built, and even a soccer field in the town directly outside Cobra Base. The members of 2nd Platoon continue to operate successfully from the De Rawoud region and are certainly making an impact there as well.

As each day passes here in Afghanistan, we count down the days until we return to our loved ones and much-missed island life. That day is fast approaching and we are beginning the lengthy and arduous process of packing up and coming home. We will certainly be leaving our replacements a base camp that is undoubtedly better than when we arrived. We will also leave them with an Area of Operations that is much healthier, prosperous, and, most of all, safer for both the Afghan people and Coalition Forces.

We miss you all more than any one letter or phone call can convey, and we can barely wait for the moment we step from the plane into the embrace of our loved ones and our beloved island.

WarDog Base,

The Wardogs at TK kicked off the New Year Eve by firing two illumination rounds and continued the

celebrations in the morning with a Barbecue courtesy of SGT Konken, PFC Hernandez and PFC Wright. SGT Dang, PFC Himes and our medic, Doc Warren received Army Commendation Medals from Bobcat 6, LTC Sellers, for their actions during Operation Asbury Park in the summer. SPC Gibbs and SPC Murphy joined the ranks of the Non Commissioned Officers when they were promoted to Sergeant. Also two Soldiers, PVT Suzuki and PVT Williams, were promoted to the rank of Private First Class. We rounded out the first week by conducting a Heavy Weapons range on the 4th.

Steel 6, LTC Neason, commander of 3-7 FA, paid Tarin Kowt a visit on 8 Jan. The Battery Executive Officer (XO), 1LT Jesus, and the Chief of Firing Battery, SFC (Smoke) Brown, both received the Army



Commendation Medal (ARCOM) for their combat actions at Salerno FOB, while SPC Wyman, the Wardog Mechanic, received an ARCOM for his actions during Operation Asbury Park as well. Steel 6 also presented the Army Chief of Staff's Coin of Excellence to SGT Konken, our Senior Cook, for his outstanding support of the Wardog Battery. The Battery conducted a Soldier and NCO of the Month Board, which was won by SGT Schuerger, PFC Suzuki and SPC Huynh. For their efforts they were granted a 4-day pass to Qatar, which they will go to in February.

The Battery continued to make improvements at the Firing Point and the Gym at FOB Ripley during January. On 16 Jan we conducted a night fire range. Muslims began celebrating Eid Al-Adha holiday and concluded with none of the gunfire with which they celebrated Ramadan. On the 23rd of Jan, the Battery fired 20 rounds of High Explosive to calibrate our howitzers. A few of the Soldiers were able to accompany the Forward Observers as they spotted the rounds. The following day we received 4 inches of snow that resulted in some minor snowball skirmishes and the building of a few snow man.

On the following day, 3rd Howitzer Section (SSG KT) along with some FDC and HQ personnel accompanied B Co, 2-5 IN on a combat patrol to the Nesh district. The worst enemy we encountered on this mission was the mud as it caked up on the howitzer. The 1SG accompanied some B Co personnel as they distributed 80 lb bags of wheat seed to local farming villages to give them an alternate crop to grow instead of opium poppies. It was evident that the locals were very grateful for our contributions.

Snow fell again on the 26th and some personnel from the Battery conducted a Video Tele Conference with family members the following day. We are beginning to see some light at the end of the tunnel as units from Iraq begin their movements back to Schofield Barracks and begin to make plans for our return movement. We thank you for your continued support and all of our Soldiers are looking forward to reuniting with our families in a couple of months.
