Aloha from Tarin Kowt, Uruzgan Province, Afghanistan! Today, 9 Oct 04, is Afghan National Election

Day. Right now, six hours into polling, things are going fairly smooth. We are experiencing about the level of activity that we expected. Voter turn-out is large and the Afghan people are taking the first democratic step in their country's long turbulent history. The Bobcats came into Uruzgan and conducted decisive combat operations alongside the 22<sup>nd</sup> MEU. They immediately followed up with smaller combat operations and operations to secure and stabilize what was essentially the Afghan Wild Wild West. Amazing results! Districts that had not conducted voter registration when we arrived turned in



impressive results by the 20 August deadline. Today, registered voters across Uruzgan return to cast their votes at the polling sites in large numbers. Afghans are out because of the secure environment that Bobcats and our Coalition partners have provided. Today is a historic day. Bobcats can be justly proud of their individual and collective roles and contributions.

Updates from our **Six** outposts in "The Stan". The Rear CP in **Kandahar** continues to be our lifeline to the world. Second Platoon, Bushmasters remain in **Kabul** and have responded to numerous incidents recently as tension mounted inside the Afghan Capitol. 3<sup>rd</sup> Platoon C Co remains in **Dey Rawoud** to work with Special Operations personnel and Afghan National Army Forces. Great work by these Soldiers continues to endear themselves to our SOF partners. Not so much with the Taliban though! The remainder of Cobra is now in **Cehar Cineh** at Firebase Cobra. Cobra base has handled engagements in this area with extreme professionalism. Quickstrike at **Khas Uruzgan** continues to occupy Firebase Anaconda. Recent patrols netted success with two Taliban KIA and two WIAs that managed to escape capture. Patience pays off along with effective counter reconnaissance patrols. The Bushmasters continue to operate out of FOB Ripley in **Tarin Kowt**. Bushmasters have established successful relations with the Tarin Kowt AMF Commanders as well as with the District Chief and security forces in the Nesh District. Their operations are directly responsible for the destruction of several IEDs in Nesh and for security during polling set-up and execution.

This has been a long month with many difficult tasks. Afghanistan remains a dangerous place but there is improvement on a daily basis thanks to the efforts of the Bobcats! Effective training, good leadership, and individual discipline continue to enhance our success. No one is attempting to be a hero. We are simply addressing the challenges of a developing Afghanistan one challenge at a time. I remain confident in our Soldier's abilities. One and all Great Americans! We WILL succeed in our assigned missions in the Global War on Terrorism – Operation Enduring Freedom. TF Bobcat IS making a real difference every day here in Afghanistan and in our security at home.

We are approximately half way through the battalion for Soldier's mid-tour leave. Keep the faith. If your loved one has not been back yet, they are scheduled and will make it out for leave. I want to thank each of you all for your support and encouragement here and at home. We have had some difficult situations arise across the battalion and you have done a great job in helping the affected Soldiers and families. You are a great strength to each other and everyone here, and we deeply appreciate all you do on our behalf. God bless.

Here is a quick update on progress and activity in the Khas Oruzgun and Chora Districts of Afghanistan.

1<sup>st</sup> platoon has been fortunate enough to have rotated two squads back for leave – seeing their faces upon return, I am thankful that everyone will have this opportunity. Construction has started on the Hosayni Valley School in which 1<sup>st</sup> platoon Soldiers received a welcoming parade of 500 people as they entered the village last month. SGT Bean was so impressed with the parade he recently reenlisted for 6 years.

2<sup>nd</sup> platoon (now back in Tarin Kowt guarding FOB Ripley) had an exciting month as well. SFC Price is acting as the Platoon Leader as 1LT John Kalaher has accepted an offer to join 1<sup>st</sup> Ranger Battalion in Savannah, Georgia. Best of luck John and Courtney, and thanks for your hard work. Despite the mundane assignment of daily guard, the Soldiers of 2<sup>nd</sup> platoon under the lead of SSG Carlson uncovered one of the larger caches we have found since being deployed. Policing up this ordnance will certainly make for a safer Afghanistan.

3<sup>rd</sup> platoon has finally joined us in Khas Oruzgun. Arriving in the first week of September, they immediately began patrolling, looking for the culprits of the recent attacks on our Firebase. SSG Ashcraft and his men had success last night in this effort, and under the lead of SFC Miramontez, 3<sup>rd</sup> platoon, will continue the hunt. SFC Miramontez has stepped up for Joe Wilson who has now assumed the role of C Company XO. Thank you Joe and Kim for your efforts, and we wish you well.

Scouts just returned from a four day mission to Chora where they are making progress in several different arenas. They have plans to build a civic center, refurbish an existing school, and believe it or not, plant grass seed and a flower bed for a park. Under the command of soon to be promoted 1LT Barry Huston and SFC Armendariz, the scouts are doing an excellent job in their new role.

SSG Jones has also joined us from TK acting as the AT section sergeant. Although we are having a few problems with maintenance, he and the men of the AT section have performed admirably on several mounted missions. The mortars, both 81mm and 60mm, have fired more rounds in defense of our Firebase than anyone

else. Both with small arms and their mortar tubes, they continue to impress me with their efforts. SSG Scott is currently our main effort as we head into the Afghanistan elections. Working with Mohammad Abrahim, the UNAMA representative, he is currently developing a plan to ensure security of the polling sites.

The cooks have found a way to make the same five dinner meals appealing and are working long hours to accommodate the Soldiers coming off patrols. Our medics have seen over 500 Afghan patients and we have just started an initiative to
