I know that everyone is excited to see 2005 arrive. It marks a very significant milestone...we will redeploy this year! Yee Haw! That said, I ask that everyone exercise optimistic caution however as we still have some very heavy lifting to do prior to our triumphant return to our loved ones. I remain impressed and awed by the individual and collective accomplishments of the Soldiers of Task Force Bobcat! My goal was always to command an Infantry Battalion and I have had the distinct honor to command the very best that the Army has to offer. Thanks for the love, prayers, and overt support during the last several difficult months. One shining example was the Christmas Stockings that arrived across the Task Force and mystically appeared to each and every Soldier on Christmas morning. We are definitely making an impact on the Army of the future with a high re-enlistment rate. Afghan winter is here as promised. We have already had double the precipitation that is average for the month of December. Not since before the Taliban has this part of Afghanistan seen so much rain and snow. The local Afghan's credit our presence with the change in weather as well as the change in their general condition across the country. Regardless it is a good sign for the future here. Temperatures are now dipping into the **MID to UPPER 20s** at night and only rising into 40-50's during the day. Yee Haw!

Updates from our **Six** outposts: The Rear CP in **Kandahar** continues to receive and push forward critical life support to include new MICH Helmets and cold weather boots. Team Battle (Bushmaster) is all together again at **FOB Ripley** for the first time since departing Ghazni in June 04. 1st Platoon, A Co is now in the Afghan Capitol conducting the CFC-A QRF and Security mission. 2nd Platoon, C Co is still in **Dey Rawoud** to work with 7th Group SOF and Afghan National Army Forces. Team Cobra continued its progress in **Cehar Cineh** and has eliminated a number of Taliban in the AO. They remain at FOB Cobra. Team Quick Strike is in snowy **Khas Uruzgan** enjoying numerous successes with their initiatives across their AO. Team Battle (Bushmaster) is operating from FOB Ripley in **Tarin Kowt** and effectively expanding coalition influence into remote Nesh/Sha Wali Kot districts.

Hopefully everyone saw the press regarding the Satellite Honolulu Marathon! Bobcats from across the task force participated and did outstanding. It was a Soldier initiated, planned, resourced and operated event. It would have never been possible without the great efforts and sacrifice of every Soldier in every company across the Uruzgan Province.





Maintain your focus! There is a lot of work yet to accomplish as we continue operations here across Uruzgan. Please continue your work to support the Bobcat Ohana on Oahu, the Main Land, and here in Afghanistan. Your thoughtfulness and sacrifices have made the time pass more quickly and made our separation much more bearable. Our thoughts and prayers remain with each of you during this time. Much Mahalo!

The Bobcat DFAC at FOB Ripley is our next priority for major construction. Bad weather has impacted a number of projects and we are struggling to heat all of our guard towers and ensure quality of life for every Soldier. This remains a constant battle in the harsh and austere environment of Afghanistan. Regardless of improvements, it is still not anything close to home. Mid-tour leave continues through the end of January 05 and at that point all Soldiers authorized to take mid-tour leave will have completed it. We will continue our 4-Day pass opportunities to Qatar until shut-down by the CJTF.

As we close out 2004 and enter 2005, please remember the sacrifice of our Brother Bobcats. Keep them and their families in your thoughts and prayers. SSG Brian Hobbs, CPL Kyle Fernandez, CPL Dale Fracker, CPL Jacob Fleischer; all fine young men worthy of our praise and remembrance. Likewise, please do not forget all of our wounded comrades ... CPL Jorge DeLeon, 1LT Drew Sloan, SPC Jeffery Guerin, SPC Joey Banegas, SFC "IZ" Izqueirdo, and SGT Zach Parinello. We wish them strength and courage as they continue to recover and rehabilitate from their respective injuries. As we contemplate their outstanding contributions to their Brother Bobcats, our Army and the United States of America we will ensure the completion of the mission they started. The stockings that the FRG sent were delivered by Santa on Christmas night.
